Winona State University (WSU) seeks a dynamic and visionary president with the experience and passion to lead a strong institution into its next phase of growth and success. Reporting to the Chancellor of Minnesota State Colleges and Universities (Minnesota State), the president is the chief executive officer of the university, serving the students, faculty, and staff of the institution while connecting it to the surrounding communities.

Founded in 1858, Winona State is a regional public university and the oldest member of Minnesota State. WSU is an affordable, mid-sized, four-year public university with a private college appeal. The university, which serves 6,165 students, has two campuses to better meet the needs of their diverse student population. The Winona campus hosts the majority of undergraduate students, while the Rochester campus supports graduate students, transfer students, and adult education students. Offering 200-plus majors and programs, a variety

of adult and continuing education opportunities, and NCAA Division II athletic programs, WSU has something for everyone. WSU is proud to have the #1 student success rate in Minnesota State and a 95% employment rate after graduation.

Widely known for its beautiful natural setting, the WSU Winona campus is nestled between picturesque bluffs and the Mississippi River—meaning rock climbing, paddle-boarding, hiking, kayaking, fishing and more are within a mile of campus.

WSU's second campus is located in Minnesota's third largest city, Rochester. The city is a dynamic hub for industry, arts, culture, and the Mayo Clinic, and is consistently ranked as one of the best places to live in the United States.

Robust community connections, as well as an innovative and forward-thinking mindset, position the next president of Winona State to build on positive momentum for the next phase of the institution's history.



University Profile

Visionary and Decisive

Authentic and Accessible

Winona State seeks a president who will maximize the institution's strong history of collective shared governance and who can harness stakeholder energy to move the institution forward together. The new president should be accessible and authentic, have the ability and the desire to work with individuals from all levels of the organization, and value listening and learning from within and outside the campus communities. The president should prioritize transparency, demonstrating thoughtful capability in judgment and action, and should hold others accountable to realize fully the institution's potential.

Resource & Community Development

Winona State has developed strong relationships and partnerships within the Winona and Rochester communities and seeks to be indispensable to the social and economic advancement of the area. To continue this commitment, the president will need to build on existing relationships and expand connections with regional businesses, local and state governments, and other institutions within the Minnesota State system, ever aware of the opportunities to promote workforce development. The president should seek outside support to advance the infrastructure, programs, and scholarships to support students and programs. Additionally, the president should engage alumni and alumnae, donors, and friends in ways that encourage loyalty to the institution and mission.



Economic Impact

According to a study commissioned by Minnesota State, Winona State University generated an annual economic impact of \$421 million in FY22.

- Winona State directly employs 812 people.
 Overall the university supports 2,897 jobs (1,935 direct and 962 indirect/induced).
- Winona State generates about \$29.7 million in tax revenues for state and local government.
- Winona State faculty, staff, and students contributed an estimated \$4.1 million in charitable donations and volunteer activities.

The study further estimated the value of the increase in productivity that degrees awarded by Winona State yield throughout the careers of its graduates. Assuming a 40-year work life, the education received by Winona State graduates will yield additional income of \$41.1 billion for its graduates (future value, discounted and adjusted to account for such factors as foregone income while attending school and outmigration).

Affordability

Winona State University has been named one of America's 100 Best College Buys for 25 years running. In addition to offering an excellent education and meaningful learning experiences for students, the university works to keep college affordable and ensure access to higher education.

Between financial aid programs, need-based institutional awards, and Winona State Foundation scholarships, students have many options to fund their education.

Winona State University Foundation

The Winona State Foundation was established in 1963 as a private, 501(c)(3), nonprofit organization dedicated to securing private gifts and grants that benefit Winona State. The Foundation exists to raise funds, steward them in perpetuity, and distribute them in ways that collaboratively support the mission of the university. It is the number one source of external support for the university.

The Foundation is governed by a 22-member board made up of professional women and men—many of them alumni and alumnae of the university—who share a commitment to Winona State and a willingness to invest their time, talent and resources for the betterment of Winona State University through fundraising and advocacy.

In Fiscal Year 2023, the Foundation funded 800 scholarships for a total of almost \$2.1M. The average award was just over \$2,600.

The Foundation Endowment ended FY23 with a value of more than \$61M, and assets totaling close to \$80M.


Winona State University has the highest student success outcomes in the Minnesota State system. Over the past six years Winona State students outperformed the state university average in terms of:

- Persistence
- · Licensure Pass Rates
- Completion
- Related Employment

Overall, educational equity gaps for Students of Color at Winona State are closing, and moving in the direction desired.

- The Gap in 2nd Semester Persistence for students of color decreased slightly (from 3.5 to 3.4) at Winona State.
- The Gap in Completion for students of color at WSU improved significantly, going from 12.7% to 9.7%. The most significant challenge in terms of this gap is financial, and WSU has introduced scholarships to help mitigate this challenge.
- The Gap in Related Employment for students of color at Winona State has hovered around zero for the past three years.

Enrollment

Enrollment, including the Winona and Rochester campuses and the adult education and outreach programs, totals just over 6,000.

- First Generation Students (Undergraduate Only) - 36.3%
- Post-Traditional Students (Undergraduate, Age 25+) 9.7%
- International 128 students from 42 countries

Between 2020 to 2030, there will be fewer traditional age students, both nationally and in Minnesota. Competition to attract the smaller number of traditional age students will be intense. At the same time, adult learners — many of them incumbent workers — have been traditionally underserved by Winona State.

During this same timeframe, Minnesota will become increasingly diverse statewide. Winona State's BIPOC student enrollment leveled off in 2022 after a decade of solid growth. The percentage of BIPOC students at Winona State also leveled off after a decade of growth. Still, Winona State is the most diverse four-year institution in the southeastern corner of Minnesota. (For context, the City of Winona is 91.2% White.)

Student Life

Students enjoy a vibrant campus life at Winona State. There are more than 140 clubs and organizations, from sports-related clubs to fraternities and sororities to honorary societies and more — there is something for everyone.

Students interested in recreational opportunities need look no further than the beautiful natural surroundings - rolling bluffs, miles of trails, the Mississippi River, and Lake Winona. The winter months are full of outdoor recreation as well - ice skating, snow-shoeing, ice fishing, and more. For those who prefer to stay indoors, you can take advantage of Winona State's 6,000-sq ft indoor rock climbing and bouldering center, the largest university climbing center in the Midwest region.

The university is also home to the student-formed KEAP Center, which supports the goal of creating an inclusive atmosphere for all people, organizations, and groups on the Winona State campus, and a Veterans' Center that provides extra support and resources for those with military service experience.

Student activities include concerts, movies, bingo, trivia, karaoke, and road trips to sites around the region. At Winona State's Kryzsko Commons Student Union, students can play billiards, table tennis, and board games any time, or check out the Warrior Esports Lounge with dozens of PC and Nintendo Switch games. Regular art exhibits, musical performances and theatrical productions round out a robust student experience at Winona State University.



Connection & Community

At its core, Winona State University is focused on building relationships where people connect, collaborate, challenge, and complement each other. WSU believes students should be able to focus on their academic progress rather than constantly managing their basic needs. The university provides services to support the whole student — everything from healthcare and mental health resources to the Warrior Cupboard food shelf and Advocacy Center.

For decades, Winona State has had a culture that puts student learning first, and the student success data captured annually reflects this. The university's emphasis on and track record in student support - from advising and tutoring to faculty engagement and facilities investments - places students' needs first. And its shows: Winona State has the highest student success rate in the Minnesota State system.

Sustainability

Winona State is the most energy efficient university in Minnesota State. WSU is committed to using its resources responsibly, investing in a sustainable future, and supporting a sustainable society. WSU was one of the first signatories of the President's Climate Commitment, and for decades, it has been working to practice and promote a culture of sustainability, with investments in:

- curriculum and academic programs like the Sustainability minor;
- opportunities to get involved, including the student-funded Green Fee and Green Action Project;
- the largest solar panel energy system in the Minnesota State system;
- proposed net-zero Center for Interdisciplinary Collaboration Engagement and Learning (CICEL);
- campus-wide guaranteed energy savings project.






Overview of Minnesota State

With 26 community and technical colleges and seven state universities on 54 campuses, Minnesota State serves nearly two-thirds of the entire state's undergraduate student population. In addition Minnesota State serves more Black and indigenous students, and students of color, than all higher education providers in the state, combined.

Minnesota State is committed to equitable outcomes for all students, and in 2019 committed to eliminating educational equity gaps at every Minnesota State college and university by the year 2030. Achieving this goal, called Equity 2030, is a moral imperative, and an economic imperative for the state as the population continues to grow more diverse. Equity 2023 will ensure Minnesota has the workforce it needs for generations to come. Minnesota State is working toward meeting its Equity 2030 goal through hard work, robust data analysis, targeted programs to improve outcomes, and partnerships with community organizations, employers, and the state legislature.
